

WSDP Radio Auction

WSDP will hold its 12th radio auction on Saturday May 13, from 9am to 10pm. The auction will be broadcast on 88.1FM. Listeners will be able to bid on items by calling the WSDP Hotline.

A dream board of special items will be available for bidding all day. The funds raised allow WSDP to update equipment. A portion of the proceeds will fund three scholarships the station offers.

In past years the money has been used for a digital audio work station, new Emergency Alert Equipment, and a computer for the main studio. Money from this years auction will go towards equipment that will allow the station to broadcast 24 hours per day.



(PLYMOUTH, MI.) — Rob Milford called to wish the WSDP staff a Happy 28th Birthday. He was on the station's staff when it signed on-air February 14, 1972.

Under the leadership of Bonny Dore, former General Manager of WSDP, the student staff began planning for station almost two years before its arrival. According to Milford the time leading up to the sign-on date was very big, "the rooms were there and then the equipment was delivered in the Fall of 1971. The engineers were plugging it in and then they put the tower on the roof... the little red light started flashing and the excitement was just tremendous."

The station signed on-air at 12 noon with a mission of training students in broadcasting and serving the Plymouth-Canton community. Milford said people like Dore, Bill Brown, former Salem Principal, and John Hoben, former Superintendent deserve great credit for their vision. "They bought into it and said 'this could be exciting, this could be educational as well,' and I think that their guess back in the early 1970s has paid off." WSDP also owes debt of thanks to past station managers Mary Phyl Sieger, Jeff Cardinal, Andy Melin and Dave Snyder, along with longtime advisor John Seidelman.

Milford knows the benefits of a program like WSDP. He now works for CBS Radio News in Dallas Texas. "At the time it gave students a leg up on the competition. We were really on the air... We had to do everything by the book, the way it would be done in a commercial station." Milford will be visiting the Plymouth-Canton area in April when the PCEP Theater Department bids farewell to Gloria Logan, long-time drama teacher and director.

Milford has made a habit of calling the station each Valentines Day. "It is always a pleasant surprise to hear from Rob," said Station Manager Bill Keith, "It's easy to get very busy with day-to-day things, but every time he calls I'm reminded about how important WSDP has been in so many people's lives."

A history of WSDP was published in 1998. This 32 page booklet was co-written by the station's six General Managers. If you would like a copy call WSDP at 734-416-7732. WSDP is owned and operated by the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools. The station is staffed by over 30 volunteer students at Plymouth Canton and Salem High Schools.

WSDP Announces New Scholarship

(PLYMOUTH, MI.) — WSDP, 88.1FM, announces the establishment of the Jeffrey L. Cardinal Scholarship.

The scholarship is named after the station's third General Manager. Cardinal served as General Manager from 1974-1982. This was a time of great change for the station as it switched frequencies from 89.3FM to 88.1 FM, and increased power to 200 watts. It was also a time of financial turbulence for the station. "Jeff's leadership was critical in keeping the station on the air," said Bill Keith, General Manager, "All students since then owe him a debt of gratitude for making sure the station survived and prospered."

The scholarship will be give to a student that:

- \sim has shown dedication and commitment to WSDP
- \sim has been an active and involved member for all four years of their high school career
- has gained substantial knowledge in multiple areas of the station's operation including news, sports, production, promotions, on-air announcing, and public service, improving the quality of the station
- ~ has the tenacity to go beyond what is expected, inspiring others to exemplify the same characteristic
- ~ Demonstrated the prerequisites in understanding the community's needs

"It is our honor to recognize Jeff for his years of service to WSDP, the Plymouth-Canton Schools and the community," said Bill Keith, Station Manager. Cardinal is now a freelance writer living in East Lansing.

Each year WSDP also presents the John Seidelman Scholarship and the Bonny Dore Scholarship. All three awards will be presented at the station's annual banquet in May.

On February 14, 1972, a proud tradition was born - and I don't mean Valentine's Day.

WSDP 88.1, Plymouth-Canton's student-run radio station, broadcast for the first time.

Since then the station has provided a unique opportunity to high school students. The station has had its share of ups and downs but has far and away been a positive program, and made a positive impact on students.

The experience left a long-lasting impression with many a student that had the opportunity to project his or her voice over the airwaves. I can remember my ex-wife once finding an old tape (during a semi-regular cleaning fit) of one of her WSDP radio shows. (She was a DJ while a student at Salem).

I took a quick look at my collection of dusty CDs and wondered if I could even come up with an hour's worth of music that anyone would want to listen to—with the exception of my brother, who lives in Oregon. I doubted that WSDP broadcasts would go quite that far.

I resolved to simply pick out a bunch of long, "art rock" songs, and hope for the best.

It took about 15 seconds for me to make a fool out of myself on the air, but that's an average time-span whenever I try something new. In the end I did relax a bit, talk more, and succeeded in making a more relaxed fool out of myself.

But it was all in good fun.

WSDP was recently voted Station of the Year by the Michigan Association of Educational Broadcasters (MAEB). It's an impressive award, and one the station has received six times in the past 11 years.

Many of the students received individual awards, too. From production to sportscasting, to sports play-by-play and, of course disc jockeys. All students deserve congratulations.

Next month, everyone has the opportunity to show their support in other ways, too. The station is preparing now for it's annual auction.

Held on the air May 13, from 9am to 10pm, the auction is the station's biggest fundraiser. There are many ways to help—businesses can donate auction items, guest auctioneers are needed, and, naturally, the auction cannot be a success if no one listens to the program or bids on the items.

So when then time comes, it will be easy to show your support. Just tune in, listen for a few bargains, and pick up the phone.
